You may still show your finds even if you do not wish to compete in the Find of the Month.

April Meeting:

Our speaker was Clint McKenzie, Chairman of the South Texas Archeological Association. Clint worked as an archeologist for the City of San Antonio, and was involved with a number of interesting projects including a survey of the Alamo and the Spanish Missions. He shared experiences from his work in archeology and talked about the commonalities between metal detecting and archeology. Clint emphasized that we can collaborate on many projects and that metal detecting can play a beneficial role in archeological research. There was time for discussion and Q & A afterwards.

After the Find of the Month activity we had our regular monthly club fundraiser for a silver dollar and White's pin pointer donated by Larry Vickers. Thank you Larry!

April Club Activities:

Wall Ranch:

Five club members met at the Wall Ranch in Spicewood to follow up with a detecting survey of the property. Our goal is to locate the old (1870's) home site and other areas of historical significance. We searched a large area across the creek, and did not find any old or significant targets. Bob Wishoff is heading up this project and is doing an archeological survey. Our next step is to contact Bob to determine what further follow up is recommended.

Texas Council of Treasure Clubs Show – Fort Worth, April 28-30:

Our club boasted having **sixteen** members attend the treasure show this year! We were very proud of our Austin Club booth. It looked really good with the display of antique metal detectors hanging on the bright yellow back drop. The tables were covered with black material and held a number of interesting displays donated by members, and our bright yellow club banner was pinned on the front of the table cloths. This big annual show included displays from other clubs all over the state, metal detecting vendor booths, related metal detecting booths and activities, a silent auction and hourly seminars on various subjects. Saturday evening was a banquet with a speaker from Garrett metal detectors, and Sunday morning was the big competition hunt. Hunters were Daniel Mireles, Larry Vickers, Blaine Nelson and sister Jill Nelson. Larry found two tokens he turned in for a gold peso and a Garrett Ace 250. Way to go!

Thanks to all club members who assisted with the show – by donating displays, helping with the booth, donating items for the silent auction etc. It takes EVERYONE to pull off a successful show. Special thanks to Betty and Larry Vickers, and Jim Lawhon and grandson Hayden Lose who transported the displays, put up, set up – stayed the entire time, and took down the displays. Believe me, this is quite an undertaking!
